Dear Mount Greylock Families and Friends:

Over the past two years, Mount Greylock has altered and adjusted traditional practices and norms to preserve the integrity of our arts programming and maintain the benefits it provides our students.

The community and school remained committed to offering arts programming while often having to think differently about how teaching and learning took place.

The music program culminated the 2020–21 school year with an outdoor spring concert. This performance highlighted the hard work, determination, and talent of our student body, with the participation of a sizable group of students in our new jazz band. Weekly rehearsals demonstrated student learning, comprehension of basic improvisation, and an ability to read in a new style. GreylockPlays, a 25-minute concert at the start of school, remained an effective way for our ensembles to share their love of music with the wider school community.

All middle school students received a full year of electives, including those taught by our performing arts teachers. Individual lessons and small ensembles were integrated throughout the year as supplemental instruction.

A variety of visual arts and media courses for students provided an outlet for students to express themselves and explore new ideas. Student work in drawing, painting, ceramics, stained glass, and photography remained on display throughout the first floor. In addition to traditional mediums and materials, alternative materials, equipment, and tools were prepared, organized, and packaged for movement to students' home studios (whether *studio* meant a kitchen table, living room rug, bed, or basement). Individual cell phones took the place of our professional Canon cameras in photography and video editing courses.

The entire Mount Greylock community remains grateful and inspired by the perseverance and compassion of the greater communities in which we live. Thank you for your continued support of the performing and visual arts at Mount Greylock. We look forward to seeing you at many of this year's performances outside of and — finally — in the building.





COVID note: During limited programming due to COVID restrictions, our wonderful Williams student Fellows have been focused on free tutoring after school, targeted classroom support, and college essay help. In addition, Williams Fellows are mentoring and currently leading the Greylock Multicultural Student Union (GMSU), the Creative Writing Club, and the HS Diverse Books Club.


